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meticulously preserved spiritual heritage. iv These include well-known historic cities like Samarkand, Bukhara, Khiva, and Shakhrisabz that are listed as UNESCO World Heritage sites. Furthermore, Uzbekistan is a nation with deep Islamic heritage. The nation is home to dozens of historical Sufi sites and more than 160 historically significant Muslim sites. These include the Bakhauddin Ensemble in Bukhara, the Bayan-Quli Khan Mausoleum, the Saif ed-Din Bokharzi Mausoleum, the Mausoleum of Sheikh Zaynudin Bobo, Sheihantaur, and the Mausoleum of Zangiata in Tashkent, among many others. Additionally, Uzbek wine and food can draw tourists interested in gastronomy. However, Uzbekistan's tourism sector continues to encounter issues. These include inadequate transportation and payment systems, a scarcity of suitable hotels, medical services, language assistance, and tourist information.

Today, the growth of the nation's tourism industry depends heavily on digital platforms and will continue to do so. Uzbekistan's attempts to grow its tourism industry were hampered by the difficulty of applying for a visa. On July 15, 2018, Uzbekistan implemented electronic visas for citizens of 77 nations, including the US, in an effort to address the issue. The validity of a single or multiple entry visa is 30 days. A single-entry electronic visa costs \$35, while a multiple-entry one costs \$50. Applicants must submit their applications for the e-Visa at least three days prior to their trip. Citizens of 65 nations are exempt from requiring a visa to enter Uzbekistan for stays of no more than 30 days. Azerbaijan, Armenia, Belarus, Georgia, Kazakhstan, Kyrgyzstan (for a maximum of 60 days), Moldova, Russia, Tajikistan (for a maximum of 30 days), and Ukraine have also established a bilateral visa-free regime.

In 2024, Uzbekistan offers an array of transportation options for tourists, enhancing connectivity to its cultural and historic sites. The *Afrosiyob* high-speed train provides rapid transit between Tashkent, Samarkand, and Bukhara, cutting travel times to just a few hours, while the *Sharq* train offers a slower, scenic journey with stops at smaller towns. [1] *Uzbekistan Airways* connects Tashkent to cities like Nukus, Urgench, and the Fergana Valley, making distant regions accessible. Recent fleet upgrades ensure safety and comfort on domestic routes. *Intercity buses* and shared taxis offer affordable travel. Buses provide a glimpse of rural life, while shared taxis are faster but vary in comfort. Both options are popular with tourists and locals. Tashkent *Metro* offers efficient city travel with its Soviet-era decor and affordability. *Apps* like Yandex.Taxi provide convenient rides in major cities. *Car rentals* allow flexible exploration, especially between major sites. Cycling and walking tours are popular in Samarkand, Bukhara, and Khiva, where monuments are close together.
