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Abstract

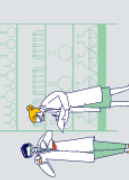

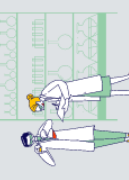
resources. Therefore, he focused on improving army organization and introducing more effective tactical systems.

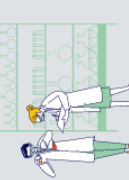

Eventually, Babur achieved a decisive victory that changed the political history of India forever. This battle proved that effective leadership, planning, and innovation could overcome even the largest armies. Military historians often describe Panipat as a turning point in South Asian warfare because it introduced new tactical concepts and modern battlefield organization.
